It's one thing to recruit talent, it's another to keep it all happy and focused on team goals so that they play together with passion. Alabama must be pretty good to get them into overtime and hold them to a handful of field goals. The Lamestream Sports Media Dumb-Ass Article of the Week goes to Rick Reilly, who calls the first LSU/Alabama game "Dullapalooza" and doesn't want a rematch, which he believes only follows from the national "SEC bias" that he believes accounts for the fact that SEC teams keep winning championships over high-scoring teams from lesser leagues. As you may know, the Heisman Memorial Trophy committee has granted a vote to one local pseudonymous football blogger, and this year it is my privilege to cast this vote. They also need to be a threat of some sort themselves as either a passer or runner or both. So they justifiably get a lot of attention in the conduct and outcome of games. Before Saturday's games, I checked on the national ranking of quarterbacks in terms of QB rating, which is imperfect but does tend to provide a good conversation starter. Here's the national top 40:

OK, I'm not quite ready to give the Heisman to Zach Mettenberger, lofty QB rating notwithstanding, although it'll be fun to see what he does as a 2-year starter in a program that might win several national championships in the next few years. What's interesting to me is that guys like Landry Jones are on a lot of Heisman lists, and even in a pass-first offense built around the QB's skills, he's pretty far down the ratings list, well behind Aaron Murray, who is in nobody's Heisman discussion this year, even as both teams finish out at 9-3 and even as OU is somehow rated ahead of UGA in the final rankings after losing a home game to bottom-feeder Texas Tech.

The first thing I do with a list like this is kick off the guys who play against lesser competition. First to go is Case Keenum, whom I saw on Saturday for the first time and who is strictly a dinkand-dunk system quarterback with inflated stats against bad teams. Also the guys from Toledo, Ohio, and Northern Illinois; and Kellen Moore needed to go unbeaten to be a player in this competition.

Once the smoke clears, it seems that Russell Wilson and RG3 have had substantially better seasons than anyone else at QB. Both are reputed to be super-good-guys in the locker room and beyond, and both are in major conferences, albeit not conferences with SEC defenses. Wilson played with a superior running attack (see below), so you could argue that RG3 is the nation's top QB this year, given that he was the whole show at Baylor and had them winning big games for the first time in ages.

Luck, Weeden, and Barkley comprise the next tier, and each plays in a league where offense comes first. Luck plays in a glorified Arena Football League when it comes to defense, so I don't trust his gaudy stats, even though Rick Reilly has already awarded him the Heisman. Weeden is disqualified because guys D.J. Shockley's age should not still be playing college football. And Barkley is coached by Lane Kiffin, which removes him for consideration automatically. I'd like to see what these guys could pile up against the better SEC Ds, which I suspect would be similar to what Sam Bradford, the resident hoodlum from Oregon, and other luminaries have achieved in recent national championship games: not much.

Running backs also get Heisman consideration, and Montee Ball, LaMichael James, David Wilson (VaTech), and Trent Richardson have been the best of the power conference runners this year (in that order, if yardage is the measure of success here). SEC fans think that only Richardson is a viable Heisman candidate, although the other guys have had comparable years, and Ball is by far the leader of them all in terms of scoring touchdowns. So, all things considered, who gets my Heisman vote? Tyrann Mathieu. He just killed us on Saturday, and it was a typical game for him. Not bad for the smallest guy on a field filled with Brobdingnagian Beasts.
