Defensively, Georgia did not give up a play longer than 20 yards, but quarterback Kellen Moore took aim at Georgia's zone coverage, completing 28 of 34 passes for 261 yards and three touchdowns. "That was how we figured they were going to use their personnel," Boise State offensive coordinator Brent Pease told the Idaho Statesman. "We didn't know they were going to be as wide open as they were sometimes.'
