It was one of the greatest games in one of college football's oldest and greatest rivalries. It took a miracle to win it, and I sure do hate it when someone else's miracle comes at my team's expense.

Rarely have I felt so discouraged at the end of a game's first quarter. We got dominated on both lines of scrimmage and seemed to have half the energy of Auburn. The only question after 15 minutes was how high Auburn would run it up on a team that inexplicably was unprepared to compete on this Saturday afternoon.

The second quarter we showed signs of life, but Auburn kept attacking. The one glimmer of hope came from our success at keeping them out of the endzone and in field goal mode, one of which we blocked and the rest of which kept the game within reach, if only faintly.

Our scoring drive to open the second half raised my hopes to a reasonable level, only to have them sliced to bits when Auburn scored yet again. At the beginning of the third quarter, Danielson had put his feet up and started talking about the Iron Bowl as the biggest game of the year, matching unbeaten Alabama against one-loss Auburn in a game filled with anticipation. What would it take for UGA to take the lead? They'd need three possessions, but the clock suggested time for only two. The only way, he speculated, for UGA to win the game was to succeed on one, maybe two onsides kickoffs following no-nonsense drives that preserved enough time for us to get on the board with three more TDs. Very unlikely, it seemed; and we appeared to be headed for a very depressing loss in which we were not only outplayed in virtually every facet of the game, but out-prepared and out-hustled from top to bottom.

And then the comeback began. The offense clicked, and the defense finally began causing the short possessions we needed to get back in this thing. One score, two...and suddenly we had the ball with the chance to take the lead, with Murray on a roll and Auburn on its heels. One

magnificent drive later, capped by Murray's power scramble in which he willed himself just into the endzone, put an exclamation point on one of his greatest games in his great career as a Dawg. Suddenly, our problem changed from having too little time, to scoring too early and giving them time to mount one final drive.

Three downs for Auburn produced minus five yards, and our defense was playing with fire and ready to seal the win with one last stop. And then, the luckiest bounce I've ever seen gave Auburn the lead and a highlight that they'll be playing on their jumbotron for the next hundred years. Twenty-five seconds to go.... not enough time to do much except hope for a miracle of our own. But Murray, as he did against Alabama last year, got the team down the field for one last play, 3 seconds to go from the 25 yard line.....but the play we needed so desperately never materialized, and one of the most extraordinary games I've ever seen ended in defeat and immortality in the annals of the season and the UGA-Auburn series.

I remain elated by our comeback, crushed by the loss. An inch here or there at so many points of the game, different calls by officials on fumbles and spots—any number of hair-breadth shifts in any number of facets of the game, and it might have been different. But it's in the books as an L. Life can be so cruel.

Robert Edwards was recruited to UGA to play cornerback by Ray Goff. After starting at the position early in his career, he shifted to RB his junior year, finishing his career in what initially appeared to be the very promising Jim Donnan era. Robert was among the top players in the SEC when not injured, which happened often enough that he never played a whole year, even taking a redshirt season to recover from a broken hand. He nonetheless was the Patriots' top pick in the 1998 draft and rushed for 1,115 yards as a rookie before destroying his knee during an NFL rookie flag football game in Hawai'i during Pro Bowl week, an injury so severe that his leg was almost amputated and he was told he'd never walk again. But through a rigorous training and recovery regimen, he rehabbed to the point where he returned to the NFL, winning the Pro Football Writers Association Halas Award for his comeback with the Dolphins. He remained in the game, going to the Canadian Football League and playing four more years of pro ball for the Montreal Alouettes, for whom he had two 1,000 yard seasons and was twice named to the CFL Eastern Division All-Star Team. Since leaving the pro game at the end of 2007, Robert has stayed busy, primarily as a head football coach at the high school level. Robert was head coach at Arlington Christian School in Fairburn from 2010-2012 and now is head coach at Greene County HS in Greensboro. But that's not enough. He's also been involved in assisting former athletes with job placement and career development at All-American Resources and is the founder of the STAR Training Academy, which states its purpose as believing that "There can be no greater legacy for this organization than the creation of opportunities for young people to grow, mature and become better citizens through participation in athletic competition. We strive to build young men of character, demonstrate class and humility and bolster an atmosphere of hard work, effort, and discipline that permeates throughout our program. Accepting the idea that, "you deserve to be a champion." Their motto, WHAT YOU BELIEVE, DETERMINES WHAT YOU OVERCOME! is what you'd expect from a mentoring program designed by Dawg great Robert Edwards, given all that he's fought through and conquered himself.
