## Seeing is believing.

Call me a believer. As all six of my readers know, I always have been a believer in Mark Richt's football program at UGA. But after Saturday, I believe that this team can accomplish just about anything this year. The last 9 minutes of the game, beginning with our inspired goal-line stand and extending throughout the drive beginning at the 6-inch line all the way to the 0:00 point on the game clock, were magnificent. Having Douglas come in and pound the rock on this drive illustrates well one of my favorite annual experiences: seeing which new guys step into key roles. The defensive backs are getting targeted, but I think they're going to be much better at this by the LSU game and the league gauntlet that follows it. Watching them, and Hicks, and Floyd, and Taylor, and Scott-Wesley, and a slew of others is a lot of fun to behold.

Nonetheless, during my ritualistic visit at halftime to discuss the world's great events with the Scowlmeister, Foghorn Bullhorn, and Foghorn's lovely wife, Mrs. Bullhorn, the Scowlmeister was looking gloomy. Even with the score tied, he said, he felt as if we were losing. His lugubrious outlook followed a second quarter in which we had let a great lead slip away as Connor Shaw kept making remarkable plays, as he often seems to do. Although it seemed that we could score at will, it seemed that they could too.

I'll confess that the 3-and-out with which we opened the second half caused even my own high spirits to droop. But after that, we took increasing control of the game. I rewatched the game on Sunday on the Big Screen, and Blackledge said in the second half that UGA was more likely to become fatigued as the game wound down, because we had played a late, physical away game on Saturday while SC had played a far less competitive home game on Thursday, giving them a much longer recovery time for Saturday. But the goal line stand and subsequent 8 minute drive to end the game suggest that we were more physically prepared for this game.

There were so many great plays in this game, so many momentum shifts, such great coaching decisions, such fabulous support from the 93,000+ in attendance—just one incredible afternoon of football. Clowney made a couple of plays, but in general was neutralized by outstanding game planning and execution. That didn't stop Negatron—who is positioning himself to replace Coach Knute "Bear" Lombardi as 2013 Sanford Stadium Jackass of the Year following the Coach's being raptured at halftime of the 2011 Auburn game—from complaining that Kenarious Gates "wasn't even trying" to block Clowney on one of the few occasions that Lawrence Taylor 2.0 made a tackle. In the Scowlmeister's post-game remarks, he wrote, "I had an A-hole behind me screaming at Mike Bobo every time we didn't gain 5 yards on a play. He seemed to miss the fact that his plan and play selection were amazing; he took Jadeveon Heisman out of the game." How can Bobo be so dumb, and Gates such a matador, on a day when we hung 41 points on a first-rate SEC defense that features the single most fabulous human specimen ever conceived by the Almighty?

Coveted Dawgmeister Game Balls go to just about everyone in the program, from coaches to tutors at the Ramsey Center. With so many plays run by both teams, such depth required to endure the long hot afternoon, and such great coordination required across so many disparate players and units, this one was a complete team victory and a great launching pad for a run back to the SEC title game.

Todd Gurley is a one-man army. One thing I got from watching the TV broadcast was that right up to the kickoff, the trainers were testing his thigh to see how fit he was to play. So he ran hard through a very rugged and talented defense for important and brutal yards on a bad leg. Because he got hurt on his first carry of the season, he's pretty much played both games injured in a vulnerable and essential area.

He is easily the best back to play at UGA since Garrison Hearst. Here are Hearst's 3-year totals at UGA:

Hearst was a college All-American, was the 3<sup>rd</sup> overall pick in the draft by Arizona, played 10 years for the Cardinals, Bengals, 49ers, and Broncos, had four 1,000 yard seasons in the NFL, and is one of only two NFL players to have won the NFL Comeback Player of the Year Award twice. Gurley is playing with Aaron Murray; Hearst started out with <u>Greg Talley</u> and finished with <u>Eric Zeier</u>. Murray and Zeier are roughly equal, so neither could be said to have

lower stats because of the quarterback or system. Gurley will be much more productive than Hearst was, so it's been a while since UGA has had an RB this good.

I had to go all the way back to the very early 1980s to find a running back this good in this program. Here's the best guy I could find from back then. A guy named Herschel Kendall Walker had these stats:

Walker got a lot more carries and substantially more yardage, especially given that they played a total of 12 games in his day, while Gurley plays 14 if we win the East. But Gurley's yards per carry average is higher. I think that Gurley playing with Murray, and Walker with Belue, explains why Walker would get more carries, given that they are passers of a different caliber and that the offensive plan revolves around the QB's skills. Gurley also shares time with Marshall, and shares the backfield with an emerging star in Hicks, whose role will surely expand in Gurley's last two years here.

At this point, the difference is in how Gurley and Walker are regarded. It's becoming more common for TV guys to say that Gurley's the best back in the country. If there's anyone better, please let me know. There's a growing perception that Todd's a rare player. The question is, though, whether he's this year's Moreno or Ingram, or someone of more elevated stature.

Walker, from his freshman year on, was perceived as being a truly transcendent talent. In hindsight, he stands out from just about every other college running back in history. Wikipedia says: "Walker is regarded as one of the top college running backs of all time. In 1999, he was selected to Sports Illustrated's NCAA Football All-Century Team. On the Fox Sports Net show *Sports List*, Walker was named the best college football running back of all time and was selected as the third greatest player in college football history by ESPN." He won a Heisman and was the star of an unbeaten national champion. Stats aside, that's the level you have to reach to be considered the greatest RB ever at UGA. I hope Gurley does it.

Incidentally, in 1981, Walker's sophomore season, the team went 10-2, but 6-0 in league play to win the SEC in the pre-playoff era. Their only regular season loss was to Clemson. Sound familiar? At season's end, Dan Marino's Pitt team beat them in the Sugar Bowl.
