THE DAWGMEISTER'S WEEKEND FORECAST: CARDS STACKED IN DAWGS' FAVOR

I'm still so crushed and deflated from the Georgia Tech game that I can hardly get out of bed in the morning. Wags, the family bulldog, has been moping in his doghouse since the weekend after Thanksgiving. It just don't get any worse than this.

But I'm gaining momentum to pull for the Dawgs against the steaming pile of Petrinos in the Belk Bowl. A little known fact: Charlotte, NC, the bowl game's host city, is a leader in the development of <u>standardized test questions</u>, such as: "LaShamanda has a heterozygous big bootie, the dominant trait. As valuable a player as Boss Andrews has been for us for a seeming eternity, I think that by the time we break camp in August, we'll have a solid replacement snapping the ball for the 2015 season, and that he'll be surrounded by one of the best sets of guards and tackles that our program has ever produced. Houston may get a shot at center, but if not him, one of the younger pups who got their uniforms dirty in 2014 and are ready for serious action next year. When considering Isaiah Wynne's prospects for starting at center, Boss astutely noted that, "We've got to see if he can snap the football. That's kind of the

equalizer at that position as whether you can put a ball between your legs." No argument here.

Although Todd Gurley will be gone—and it seems he hardly played in his third and final year—and although Keith Marshall may never recover from his injuries, the Nick Chubb Express should keep our ground game rolling, and Sony Michel should benefit from the weight room enough to run mighty strongly in 2015. One innovation for the Auburn game, before TG's knee blew out, was running sets with both Gurley and Chubb in the backfield. One of Chubb's biggest plays came when Todd flared out to the left and Mason dropped off a middle screen that went to the right when half the defense ran after Gurley. More of the same with Sonick the Hedge Dawg next year, I hope. I don't know if and how A. J. Turman is recovering from his many injuries, but I've seen film of incoming JC RB Chris Carson, and that cat can run. The backfield will be fun to watch in 2015.

But given the anticipated rise of Brice Ramsey to the starting QB position, we won't need to run the ball 60 times a game to compete. I think that we'll return to our balance of 2013, and that the incoming class of WRs will collectively make up for losing Conley and Bennett, two guys who sacrificed a lot to make 2014 the Year of the Run. Next year we'll roll out Malcolm Mitchell, Reggie Davis, Justin Scott-Wesley, Isaiah McKenzie, Shakenneth Williams, Charlie Hegedus, Kenneth Townes, Blake Tibbs, Terry Godwin, Von Jefferson, Darius Slayton, Shaquery Wilson, and Michael Chigbu; and Blazevich and Rome and others at TE. Some might redshirt, others might slip behind newcomers, but either way, we'll have a passing attack that will light it up.

On defense we lose the ILBs who've manned the interior for several years now, but Kimbrough and Carter are now game-ready, UAB tackling machine Jake Ganus will be in the rotation, and others are itching to play. We now have an experienced secondary with a lot of talent, even if they didn't have recruiting star power of the sort coveted by the fan base. Quincy Mauger came in as Brendan Langley's lesser high school teammate, but has emerged as a hard-knock safety in the tradition of Thomas Davis and Greg Blue and an intelligent leader in the defensive backfield. Don't worry; the 4-stars are now backing up the walkons and afterthoughts, so should work their way onto the field eventually. And the OLB trio of Jenkins, Floyd, and Hurricane Carter already has me salivating. Bring on 2015, and the sooner the better.


DAWG DOOTS

THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD GOOD GUY ARCHIVE

This week's Good Guy is one of the most underappreciated Dawgs of all time: former quarterback, quarterbacks coach, and offensive coordinator **Mike Bobo**. I don't know how often I've sat in the stands listening to the people around me moan and groan about his playcalling and quarterback coaching. The most clever of his critics call him Bozo how'd they ever think of that one? But the fact is that he was a hell of a guarterback, a hell of a quarterbacks coach, a hell of an offensive coordinator, and a hell of a good guy. Mike's from Augusta, where he played high school ball for the Thomasville Bulldogs. As a senior, he was named the 1993 Georgia Player of the Year by USA Today and the Atlanta Journal-Constitution after completing 329 of 590 passes for 5,167 yards and 42 TD's and running for 15 TD's. His completion record might look pedestrian by today's dink-and-dunk standards, but 56% was pretty high when the passing game primarily required a QB to throw downfield. At UGA he was a stellar QB, lettering for four years from 1994-97 and being good enough for the coaches to move Hines Ward from QB to WR. Mike remains among UGA's career leaders in many passing categories and was elected team captain (1996-97) and permanent team captain of the 1997 Bulldogs. Since then, he has spent every season but one coaching the Dawgs between the hedges. His early teams ran offenses that had an old-school SEC power run look, but as the game changed, he changed with it, adding multiple sets and ramping up the passing game. As even the most jaded of Dawg fans is finally aware, he ended up overseeing offenses that set records no matter who was hurt and no matter how far down the bench he had to reach to put healthy players on the field. I think I'm one of many millions of Dawg fans who now wish Mike and his wife Lainie, along with children Drew, Olivia, Jake, Ava Grace, and Kate, all the best as his career takes a great leap forward with Colorado State. Thanks, Mike, for being one of the Top Dawgs ever.
