On this day when #11 flew home to Sanford Stadium from Kansas City to watch his team play against its greatest nemesis; when #11 on the opposing team came in as one of the most feared weapons in the college game; on this day, #11 in Red and Black had the greatest day a collegiate passer has ever had. Entering the game with doubts about the quality of play at the game's most important position, and doubts about how they would compete against elite talent, the Dawgs hung half-a-hundred on a program whose success has been sustained in the Spurrier Era by its well-coached and physical defenses.

And thank heaven, my unending

confidence in our coaches' ability to evaluate talent, put the best team on the field, and call the plays that win games and championships was confirmed in one of our most impressive wins in memory. And I think that we are still holding back the deep passing game, because we never needed it on Saturday. We'll know after Alabama comes avisiting in a few weeks just how big our playbook is; that is, if Bama can keep pace with our base offense and we need to open it up.

Some might say, Well, SC is down this year. Their starting QB had a lot of holes in his game, and their backups generated next to nothing against us. Orth, the starter and former walkon, had little to work with, and I was much more comfortable in the stands with him under center than Nunoz, his backup who had some success running the ball. In terms of their passing game, #11, projected first-rounder Pharoh Cooper, caught one pass for 6 yards and was only a minor factor in the run game.

But we've taken on Spurrier teams before, thinking that we had the superior team, only to have the ol' coach reach into his magic bag and find ways to take us down. Blowing out an annual threat has positioned this team for a run at greatness.

That's how Dawg Good Guy **Steve Herndon** introduces himself on his Twitter page, and he sounds like the ideal product of the Mark Richt Georgia Way. Back in La Grange, Steve played high school football with Warren Mathis, better known to the music world as Bubba Sparxxx, and well, I guess Steve has a few country rap CDs in his collection as a result. At UGA Steve was a star on the OL, ultimately serving as 1999 Team Captain.

While he was at it, he was a three-time Academic All-SEC performer in the classroom and 1999 Academic All-American District III. Steve killed it in the weight room too, earning the Leon Farmer Strength and Conditioning Award in 1999, given annually to the player whose dedication to the strength and conditioning program results in a significant contribution to the football team.
