Jacob Ice. Mighty nice.

This was a huuuuge game for Kentucky. With Florida getting hammered in Fayetteville, they controlled their own destiny toward a showdown with Alabama, and in a rare display of fan support, sold out their refurbished and expanded stadium. Even basketball fans were stoked to see them take down our reeling Dawgs and continue their march toward a championship rematch with the Evil Empire from Tuscaloosa, a.k.a. the IMG Academy of college football.

The pregame broadcast focused on Kentucky's dynamic offense with its versatile QB and wildcat permutations. It's always interesting to me to see where pregame hype is focused. Given that Kentucky's uplifting season narrative is such a rarity, and that Florida's loss suddenly made UK this Saturday's Team de Jure, or at least the best storyline the SEC had to offer outside Baton Rouge in the evening slot, it made sense to make their versatile, run-oriented offense the epic story on which to build a broadcast. And what would Brent Musburger do without a compelling narrative? Prep for the game so he could get the players' names right? Naaah. As he said, he spent the afternoon watching other games, and then spent half of ours watching the Alabama-LSU game. At least Kathryn Webb wasn't in attendance.

The pregame focus on UK's O did not leave me quaking. I am pretty confident in our defense, and didn't think that a one-dimensional team would give us such trouble that we'd have to score just to stay in the game. And how about that. When it was all over and the fans left Commonwealth Stadium blue both inside and out, the stat line read: UGA, 42 carries for 215 and a 5.1 ypc, and UK, 40 carries for 186 and 4.7 ypc. And we doubled their passing yardage to boot. Is our offense now repaired? On Saturday, it worked well

enough to get to 5 Ws and produce such a great vibe that Coach Smart was effusive in his praise of his team's character and performance. It seems that a little humility from our awful stretch of games has given him an appreciation for his players, a feeling of respect that we have seen little of since December. It's something I've been hoping for, and that I believe is only the beginning of a new stance in the program.

I started this week's forecast with Jacob Ice, and will end with a note of admiration for his outstanding play. Although his completion percentage is not off the charts, he has an excellent TD/INT ratio for a true freshman in a beastly league, and his percentage might be accounted for by the fact that he actually throws passes away when the receivers are covered, that he still has a lot of drops among the WR corps, and that his blocking hasn't served him well for the most part. Yesterday, the OL both protected the passer and opened holes for the runners. Maybe it's because it was Kentucky, but maybe it's because something's clicked for them. Well, I've hoped that before, and Auburn will be a tougher test.

But we began the 4th quarter in arrears, and he put us ahead and beyond with a pinpoint 2-point conversion pass. Then UK tied it late, and he moved the team down the field and into short FG range with little clock to play with, and with 0:00 left when he was done. Michel was superb on the drive, but Jacob's rocket on a deep out to Terry Godwin was a pass that few college QBs can throw. We don't win this game without a Man in the pocket, and Eason once again showed that he's at his best in a tight game with the clock ticking down. This cat can play.

THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD



Richard Samuel had a frustrating career at UGA. He came in as a great athlete whose main question was whether he'd star on offense or defense. At Cass HS he was a 2008 SuperPrep Elite 50, All-America, All-Dixie teams, PrepStar Top 135 Dream Teamer, 2007 AJC Super 11, All Stater as a linebacker, #24 player in America, #4 RB in nation, #12 player in the South, #1 player in Georgia, and more. He began on offense, and had some brilliant games with a style that was all cannonball, with no wiggle or adjustment to the hole, just a blast ahead, hell-bent-for-leather approach to punishing defenders. This approach had its limitations, and after a switch to defense, Richard returned to the offensive backfield, mostly in a reserve role. His greatest moment came when he carried the Dawgs to a rare win over the hated Florida Gators, a game in which he injured his ankle on a TD run and never regained his spot in the rotation. Richard also excelled in the classroom, being named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll, the Director's Honor Roll, and Athletic Director's Honor Roll, and earning two Peter and Kay Amann Football Scholarships. For his outstanding dedication to the team, he was named the UGA Sportsmanship Award winner as well, no doubt because he was still allin for the team, even after having his carries cut down to mop-up duty his senior season. Richard got some NFL looks, but then began his post-gridiron life with several internships. He has now found his calling with the opening in 2015 of the Richard Samuel Performance Training center in Athens. I can't imagine a better young man for helping others develop themselves physically.
