Saturday evening, after about 25 carries, I thought to myself, Nick Chubb's losing steam. NC had begun to stuff his runs; he's just not as explosive as he was earlier, I thought in the third quarter. Too many carries, too soon, I thought. It's been a valiant afternoon for a true warrior, but maybe the coaches saddled him up a few times too many.

And then, when I thought that maybe he'd played his best ball of the evening already, he went off on that magnificent 55-yard rampage, running over, through, and past those blue boys who, it turned out, might have gotten worn out themselves trying to bring down our runners all day.

All summer we've been hearing about Heisman candidates—Fournette, Rosen, Watson, McCaffrey, Cook, Mayfield, and others—with Chubb presumably too badly injured last year to make a difference this season. Not anymore.

Much was made of the freshmen who got into the game, and I was as impressed as anyone with Eason and Herrien. But aside from one costly mental error, David Marshall was a terror. That cat can play.

On the whole, the defense played a terrific game. UNC was supposed to be better than last year's offensive juggernaut, but put up 17 points plus a kickoff return for the evening. Mitch Trubisky was supposed to be a big improvement over last year's starter because he'd played well in relief, but 24-40 for 156—that's under 4 yards per attempt, one of which ended with a safety—suggests that either we're really good or he's just okay. Given that NC returned most of their offensive stars from last year and believed that they'd gotten better at QB, I think we have got ourselves a Damn Good D.

Last thing on Eason: Most attention to his physical assets have focused on him being tall (6'-6") and having a great arm. But he's not just tall, he's long. I don't know if they do wingspan on QBs the way they do with others, but I suspect he's got a 6'-10" man's armlength. That's got to help in delivering the ball over defenders, especially with that ideal over-the-top delivery he's got.

I took in the game on The Big Screen at home, not having arranged financing for a Georgia Dome seat. The commentary between Brock Huard, whom I consider to be a solid announcer, and Bob Wischusen, who appeared to have learned everything he knew about UGA from *Cosmopolitan* magazine, at times was comical. Anyone with an internet connection knew that we'd alternate QBs, but Wischusen kept trying to manufacture an international controversy over the QB rotation. Huard did his best to say that this was the game plan, and that Lambert, with 3 sacks and few completions, was not moving the team well enough to keep #10 on the sidelines. That didn't stop Wischusen from raising the question at every turn to the point where Huard effectively said, "This again??" when the jibberjabber persisted. How do these guys get these jobs?

Huard also said, very early in the game, that Chubb will get 4-6 yards a carry for three quarters, then erupt late when the D can't match his intensity and hard running. And that's what happened. He knows a lot more about football than I do.

#### THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD



At Thomson HS in the Augusta area, **Danny Verdun-Wheeler** (at the time, simply Danny Verdun) was one of the state of Georgia's top football prospects: AJC Super Southern 100, Class AAAA First Team All-State and AAAA Defensive Player of the Year, Georgia Sports Writers Association Class AAAA All-State and Defensive Player of the Year, Region 3AAAA Defensive Player of the Year, and best player on the Class AAAA State Champion Thomson Bulldogs. To stay in shape in the spring, he competed in track and field, throwing the shot and discuss and taking home a few Region 3AAA championships in each and winning a state championship in discus during his throwing days. At UGA he had a terrific career as an outside linebacker, going from an occasional starter as a freshman to workhorse defender by his final year. He graduated in 2007 with a degree in Housing and Consumer Economics, went undrafted, and made the practice squads in Chicago and Washington before deciding to move on to life after football. That didn't last long. After a brief stint in Atlanta as a roofing inspector and insurance adjuster, he landed a position as assistant coach for the North Atlanta HS Warriors, where he spent four years, the last two as Defensive Coordinator. This experience gave him a bigger appetite for coaching and led to an opportunity with the NFL Players Association's Coaching Internship program. Last year he began the journey up through the ranks, landing a position coaching linebackers for the Division II South Dakota School of Mines & Technology. Consistent with his Good Guy profile, he makes it his business to ensure that his players are ready for life after football, the most likely possibility for the low-division Hardrockers (mascot: Grubby the Miner). "This is something I love to do and I want to do it at the highest level," he said. "If you can play and coach football all day long and get paid for it, it is the greatest thing in the world. I don't have to go be an engineer and build a rocket or anything like that, but I can draw X's and O's baby all day long." # **RB U@UGA**

<u>According to Todd Gurley</u>, at UGA "We breed running backs. We're Running Back U." Lately, we've had it pretty good at this position. Over the summer, I wondered if this current period of excellence at RB has been typical, or an outlier, compared to other periods in program history. So on a slow summer weekend, I made the following table that shows all UGA RBs selected in the NFL draft since 1936, when the draft was instituted.

It does appear that this recent period has been unusually excellent, especially if you throw in Isaiah Crowell, who is doing quite well in Cleveland these days after spending one productive yet rocky year on campus, as long as he stays off Twitter. Since Thomas Brown got drafted in 2008, we've had a pretty good set of backs in Athens, with the expectation now that we bring in two more NFL-bound backs every year or two. Given that Chubb and Michel are likely NFL backs, I can only conclude that RB has been an unusually strong position for us of late, with fullbacks accounting for a good bit of that productivity. With Holyfield and Herrien looking good and Carter and Swift on the way, we don't appear to be dropping off any time soon. Of course, the Scowlmeister is already deep in depression over the possibility that Zamir "Zeus" White will sign elsewhere in 2018.

Any period that includes Hershel Walker would have to be included in a discussion of UGA's greatest eras for RBs, and indeed the period between him and Garrison Hearst is the best rival for our current run of starpower in the backfield. Prior to Hershel, there was a 6-year gap in drafted RBs after Willie McLendon. There have been other droughts that make our recent set of backs special in the consistent quality over a multi-year stretch of time.

I think it's significant that <u>UGA first recruited African American football players in 1971</u>, making Clarke Central (Athens) HS's Horace King (1975 draft) the first Black Dawg RB; <u>Kevin McLee</u> was next and broke Frank Sinkwich's rushing records. Although I would never disrespect the backs who came before this period, especially superstars Sinkwich and Charley Trippi from the mid-1940s, I would say that in all likelihood, the RBs from the 70s on were likely greater runners for the most part than those who came before them, if today's ratio of Black to White RBs in college and the pros is indicative of an advantage of one group over the other. The rounds in which our RBs were selected suggest that even by the standards of their time and competition, backs other than Sinkwich and Trippi from the 60s and before were, for the most part, good but not great in the manner of Gurley and Chubb.

That possibility suggests that our current run is one of the greatest two periods in program history for sustained excellence at RB.

But don't take our recent success for granted and assume that is inevitable that it will continue. Smart seems to value the running game enough to make it a recruiting priority, and I hope he keeps bringing the talent to Athens. Meantime, enjoy it while it's hot, because there are no guarantees.

OK, here you go. I report what follows; you decide if my determination is right. Walker's 5<sup>th</sup> round status is deceptive in that he would have been the first player taken if the New Jersey Generals hadn't signed him, in violation of league rules, after his junior season, a shocking move that changed college football forever by allowing players to leave early.
