Eason was not exactly helped out by receivers who dropped his passes during his series; 11-20 with about 4 drops is a decent game, even considering what we all assumed was a pushover of an opponent.

Speaking of RBs: One of my country club friends—admittedly, a very small circle—wrote the following after reading last week's **RB U@UGA** feature:

The 1952 RB you listed as "Tony Morocco": While his name was Anthony Morocco, everyone knew him as Zippy. He is in the UGA ring of honor for both football and basketball. He led the SEC in points per game in 1953 and was UGA's first basketball All American that season.

Zippy was from Youngstown, OH. He played in the Big 33 All Star football game (Ohio v. PA) after his senior high school football season. He and another player from Northeastern Ohio, Vic Janowicz, roomed together that weekend and the two dominated the game. Ohio State cornered them after the game, and said, we are not letting them get away. They told Zippy he would not be permitted to play basketball at Ohio State, so Zippy passed on the scholarship and went to UGA. Janowicz did sign with Ohio State and won the Heisman Trophy in 1950. Zippy told me that story several times.

Zippy was business partners with Charley Trippi until they had a falling out. The story of their fist fight in the parking lot of Athens Country Club just a few years ago when both men were quite elderly is stuff of legend.

The first time Zippy met Mrs. McMachoman, he told her that he had a successful career in real estate around the Athens area and he chose to retire when "the broads took it over."

Back in the heyday, of the local bands wrote a <u>song about him</u>. Zippy was not a fan.

He <u>killed himself this spring</u> by jumping out of his bedroom window. He was battling lymphoma and had issues with depression.

I would eat lunch with him often and told me countless fascinating stories about his youth. He was a sweet and pleasant old man and he was a good friend. When a guy has a name as ridiculously awesome as Zippy Morocco, you've got to get it right.

Ty Frix came to UGA from Calhoun HS and a family of UGA long snappers. His dad Mitch snapped for the Dawgs in the early 1980s, and Ty doubled that term of service while on campus. Little Brother Trent has succeeded Ty in this role as well. Before walking on for the Dawgs and redshirting his first year. Ty was a stellar baller at Calhoun. He lettered for four years for the four-time Region champions and one-time state runner up Yellow Jackets, lettered twice in baseball while winning the 2005 state championship, and earned a final letter in basketball. His achievements extended to the classroom and student government; Ty was both Student Council President and Senior Class President and member of the National Honor Society, Beta Club and Key Club, earning status as class valedictorian to boot. At UGA he played the position that nobody notices unless he flubs a snap, and to his credit, he was only noticed during the two tackles he made during his career, during which he started 54 consecutive games. In addition to his flawless performance in this underappreciated position. Ty continued his exceptional work in the classroom: multiple CoSIDA Capital One Academic All-District awardee, UGA's Student-Athlete Leadership Academy inductee, recipient of the William C.
