I'd say that losing Cager and a set of centers may have slowed us down, Pickens' dominance notwithstanding. That's the way it always go at this point in the season: you find out how deep you are, because the game is so oriented to violent collisions that backups need to perform like starters. I think the guys we suited up did just fine, if not fine enough for championship-level play. We'll see about that later.

Nobody in my section complained about the defense. Some might say, sure, y'all shut them out, but y'all played another team playing a backup QB. To which I say, we may have been equally affected on offense by playing backup centers, whose snaps need to be crisp and on target for an offense to click. We didn't execute quite the way the fan base and coaches would have preferred. And yet, 27-0 sounds good to me against a solid opponent coming off a bye week.

THAT MULLEN MAGIC

Mrs. Butts was out milking the elk one night last week, so I took my talents to the internet to produce a comparison between the current Florida football coach and his two most recent predecessors:

- Jim McElwain, who was fired in midseason in Y3 for a combination of losing some games, including that week's blowout loss to UGA, and acting loony
- Dan Mullen, who is less accomplished than McElwain, yet who is still considered a genius for the ages even with a comparable blowout loss to UGA on his record
- with a little Will Muschamp thrown in for good measure.

Here are McElwain's and Mullen's records as coach of Florida:

They look pretty similar, the main differences being:

- McElwain's 2 SEC East championships and Mullen's zero;
- Their record vs. UGA (2-1 for McElwain vs. 0-2 for Mullen, and counting);
- Mullen's teams' higher rankings, which seems to reflect his odd reputation for brilliance more than his teams' performances.

Bonus coverage: In Y2 at UF, Will Muschamp was:

- 11-2, one of Florida's best 4 records since Spurrier's 1995 and 1996 teams, which went 12-1. The other 3 go to Urban Meyer's 2006, 2008, and 2009 teams (all 13-1).
- SEC Coach of the Year
- Ranked in the final top ten
- Popular with the fan base

More bonus coverage:

- Mullen's all-time record vs. Kirby Smart (including Mississippi State and annual national power Florida): 0-3.
- Will Muschamp vs. Kirby Smart (all at annual noncontender South Carolina):
 1-3.

Tactical genius Mullen's two lowest offensive outputs at Florida:

- 📮 2018: Yards: 275. Opponent: Georgia
- 2019: Yards: 278. Opponent: Georgia

Final bonus coverage: Here's how the UGA/Florida series has looked under the last 4 coaches (Meyer actually started in 2005 but I randomly cut it off at 2008 because we know he owned us, and this is about the guys who came after).

- We dominated them when Muschamp was there, ironically aside from his final year when they upset us in dominating fashion;
- McElwain beat us twice before we routed them and they cut him loose;
- Mullen got blown out once and beaten once. Will another loss next year put him on the path Muschamp took there, minus the Coach of the Year award and East championship, and perhaps without a win over UGA in his tenure there?

Buford's **Isaac Nauta** took a detour on his way to UGA to play for IMG Academy in Florida before deciding to bring his 5-star talents home for his college career. He was a major catch for new coach Kirby Smart, and did a lot of catching during his 3 years in the program. He had to check his ego at the door, because the team's commitment to running meant that he had to block his way into the rotation, something he took up with relish and a skill he'll need at the next level. "When you look at some of the backs we had and the amount of times we ran the football, just being able to block for some of those guys was something special too. Not everyone gets to say they blocked for Sony Michel and Nick Chubb and Holyfield and D'Andre Swift. We had a lot of good players. There were games where we had to block and do it well to win games and that is what we did. A big part of the tight end position is being able to do that. You have to be able to hold up against big defensive ends and something I take a lot of pride in." That team orientation took considerable humility for a guy with his receiving skills. His decision to declare for early entry in the draft produced regrets for not being on a possible national champion and because he hasn't vet completed his degree in Sport Management, which he's pursued with the help of a Watkins Family Football Scholarship, and with the recognition of a 2017 SEC Fall Academic Honor Roll appointment. On his way to the NFL Combine, he started giving back to his community and team, creating a "pledgeit" account to raise money for the Northeast Georgia Food Bank. "It's a cause that's near and dear to my heart," he said. "When the stock market crashed in 2008, there was a time me and my family were getting food from the food bank. I thought this would be a good way to give back to something that helped me and my family out." We often see these guys on the field and assume that kids who appear healthy and hearty have grown up without worrying about their next meal, but Isaac did some of that very worrying as a kid. Now he's trying to help other families put food on the table. That's some good work he's doing, and no doubt with his NFL earnings, it's not the last time he'll be giving back.



THE FORECAST DAWGS VS. AUBURN

Anyone who thinks this will be easy hasn't been paying attention. Auburn's got a solid defense and some good offensive players, and they will play us at home after a bye week. Bo Nix has a lot of potential, but he has looked like a freshman plenty as well. I think

Outside that matchup, UGA's offensive stats—the ones that the Dawg Nation and many national observers find underperforming—<u>are</u> <u>better than Auburn's.</u> All that won't matter once the whistle blows at 3:30 next Saturday, but it does speak to the likelihood that the game won't be a shootout. The good news is that our injured warriors from Saturday should be back in time to take on another opponent (now 3 straight) coming off a bye week.

I think it'll be tight, but that at the end of the game the visitors will come home with their tickets to Atlanta in their pockets. A tough, ferocious SEC game against old rivals seeking to complete memorable seasons: Dawgs 23, War Eagle 16.
