The home team was unbeaten and heavily favored against an opponent with a losing record. But the first half was a struggle. In the stands people said, Surely we'll wear them down with size and talent and pull away in the second half. And sure enough, they did. The final score: Princeton 28, Lafayette 3.

They played really physical, they rotated guys up front and did a better job against our run game than most people have, as anybody who has done in the past."

Imagine us in their situation: Fromm and Bennett down with injuries, and Nathan Priestly quarterbacking the team on the road against a favored opponent. Their QBs didn't turn the ball over or make mistakes, and got enough points to win. My hat's off to them.

All that stuff has just kept me grounded. It's really cool to see how far I've come, but there's really no looking back. I wouldn't change anything. I wouldn't be who I am today without it." J-Led eventually dominated on the field, but that's not why I'm adding him to the Good Guy roster. Rather, it's because, unlike some teammates who got off to similar starts, he got his act together and got his life and career on track. "I don't like to look back," he said. "I just like to keep moving forward and going in the right direction. Everyone has to grow up eventually. Everyone has to mature as you get older and gain experience.
