# THE DAWGMEISTER'S WEEKEND FORECAST: DAWGS SLAM 'DORES

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## SEPARATED@BIRTH?

2020 has been one of the strangest years of my life on this earth.

Watching games on TV always includes the drama of the scrolling news & score updates at the bottom of the screen. This year, the scroll alerts us to the latest game cancelled, or the breaking news on who is infected and sequestered. One of the best teams may not make the tournament because of Covid cancellations. But then when your own coach is infected and in isolation, can you really complain, especially given how ridiculously they wear face masks under their noses, around their necks, and any place but covering their respiratory intake and output openings? Have they heard of the proper way to wear a mask? Even Wags, the family bulldog, knows how to follow CDC protocols.



Which brings me to South Carolina, a team that is down a ton of players, especially on a defensive front that we shredded a week after barely breaking even on the ground just a week before. The plan was to attack the front, and it worked just about every play. As Coach Smart said on his way to the locker room at halftime, they were thin at the line of scrimmage, and the strategy was to blast away and wear them out. We punted once all day. Mission Accomplished.

I'm not especially celebrating the win, no matter how much redemption the players felt from it. I'm happy as hell, just not overly excited about hammering a team that was losing to the point of a mid-season coaching change, and that was struggling to field a competitive defense due to injuries rather than Covid. They played a freshman QB who has moxie and ended the game with a higher passer rating than JT Daniels (70.9 to 59.6, with an interception caused by a Jackson drop no doubt tanking JT's score). Their best player is Kevin Harris, one tough RB from Hinesville, GA, where he was rated in the 247 composite as a 3-star player, the #68 player in the state, and #44 running back in the country. Even with him and his hard runs, SC averaged under 2 yards per carry. I do wish they'd disaggregate sack yardage from running stats; they are unrelated and mask the true numbers of a running game. The adjusted number, discounting sacks, still held them to 2.8 per carry. And that's with Harris running like a bull. That's what happens when your front 7 has 10 tackles behind the line of scrimmage.

We're not a playoff team this year, but may have found the right combination with Daniels in the backfield to restore our confidence in ourselves as an SEC power. We won't know till next year's Florida game if 2020 was an aberration in the East pecking order. Assuming that Kyle Trask takes his Heisman and talents to the NFL, after once being considered the #2 QB at his high school and #92 Pro-style QB in the country, that ascent is very possible. We'll see how we finish, who comes back, and what the next 10 months bring to the equation.



Charlie Woerner came to UGA from Rabun County in the Georgia mountains, where he was more likely to be hunting or fishing than showing off in summer football camps. A typical day in the Woerner household: After his brother killed a deer, he said, "We brought it back and skinned it and cleaned it. Then my buddy Eli and I broke open the chest cavity and tore out the heart and went and fried it in the pan and it tasted pretty good." Don't expect to see that feast on Instagram; Charlie doesn't do social media as part of a generally quiet and humble personality. As a result of his low-drama persona and nonexistent media presence, he came out of high school underrated. It probably didn't help that he was as versatile an athlete as you'll find, and guys without specific positions often don't project easily at the next level. In high school he ran out of the backfield, caught passes from every receiver position, and was a standout defensive player in roles as diverse as cornerback, safety, pass rusher, and interior lineman.
