I will occasionally watch a soccer game, and am always amazed when, with 10 minutes to go and one team up 1-0, the announcers will talk about the game as though it's already over. Who could possibly score a goal with only 10 minutes left?

And that's how I started to feel in the fourth quarter of the Clemson game. A lead with 10 minutes left? This one's in the can.

The closer the week got to Saturday, the fewer points I thought these teams would score. The defenses were just too good, and the offenses had too many question marks. I sure didn't expect 10-3. But I was pretty sure that the over/under of 51.5 was way too many points. I was also pretty sure that my forecast of a 31-28 Dawg win was way too high a score.

Late last week, The Scowlmeister and I held a panel discussion—attended with rapt attention by both of his dogs, both taking detailed notes—on the prospects for the game. We had both recently watched the replay of the Cincinnati game on the SEC Network, and thought our defense would be fantastic this year after 8 sacks in the bowl game and a lockdown second half. Of course, we could never do that to Clemson, but the team did show promise in showcasing the 2021 roster. D.J. Uiagalelei was a major talent and would be hard to shut down—the guy put up impressive stats last year and is built like Cam Newton—but our D might keep them in check while our offense got enough for the win. But 10-3? 10-3???? Seven sacks????? With no offensive touchdowns from either team???? And with Clemson's best offensive plays coming from pass interference calls?

Of course a 10 point showing by the offense isn't going to give SportsCenter a lot of highlights to work with. JT was given a short passing game, and threw it mostly well (22-30, if for relatively few yards) to a set of inexperienced receivers. I suspect that our respect for their front seven cut back the number of long-developing plays in the playbook. They also played a soft zone, according to Kirby after the game, that made a deep game hard to throw. We didn't look the way Alabama did in blowing out Miami. But that final four-minute drill that lasted almost five minutes was pretty impressive. We can still run the ball when we need to, no matter how many first rounders are trying to stop it. And Clemson is loaded with them.

It was good to see Robert Beal getting a lot of snaps in the OLB rotation. He's a guy who was once deep down the depth chart, hit the portal, came back, and is now a key contributor. He was once an IMG mega prospect who had trouble playing past other guys. Now he's the one blocking the path to the field of the young talent.

Great moments in broadcasting:

Blaylock, a guy who lit it up till injuries sidelined him, now close to playing but held out of a gigantic opener to make sure he doesn't hurt himself or get hurt by opponents. I admire coaches who don't risk other people's welfare to advance their own. I admire this staff.

Richard LeCounte was a delight to have on campus for four years. He was Kirby Smart's first commitment. The five-star kid came in and played right away, starting his last three seasons before a freak biking accident ended his season and affected his showing for pro scouts. He's often described as having an infectious personality, one that led to leadership roles throughout his career on the field and in the locker room. His high school coach in Liberty County, Good Guy Kirk Warner, said of him: "There's that aura about him and that leadership quality. He pretty much then backed it up on the football field. He's always represented himself in a class manner. That's just the type of kid Richard is. That's how his mom and his dad raised him. Just an A1, class-act person." Coach Smart added, "He has been so loval to Georgia in an era when that's not normal. It's normal to de-commit, move here, decide late. He committed early, he was a great player, and he stayed an extra year for his senior year. He loves The University of Georgia. That makes somebody special and people will remember that for the rest of his life." His teammates found him to be motivating just to be around; said Malik Herring, "He just inspires me to be great. He just brought smiles and laughs to everybody." Richard got it done in the classroom, majoring in Sports Management and earning a J.E. and W.S. Hickey scholarship. An eager Dawg Nation awaits his NFL career and beyond, and it looks as though the Browns got the steal of the draft in taking him late after other teams backed off following his accident. But no matter what, Richard LeCounte was what we hope all of the athletes we recruit will be: a great citizen, an inspiring person, and a Damn Good Dawg for the ages.
