Welcome to Season XIII of The Dawgmeister on The Dawgbone! Thanks to my gracious hosts for providing my autumnal cogitations with a place where both of my readers can find them.

Let me introduce myself. I am The Dawgmeister. How do you do?

Last season, as you may have heard, went pretty well. Not everyone is convinced, however, that the championship was legitimate. Alabama fans still think they won the natty, scoreboard be damned. The Lamestream Sports Media insists that last year was an outlier, and might not actually even have happened. And now, the narrative for the 2022 season has been established: Alabama will take back the title that UGA temporarily borrowed, and return it to its rightful place.

So says the Lamestream Sports Media. But I seek knowledge from a higher plane. And I embrace the wisdom of philosopher-shaman Jamaree Salyer, who climbed the mountain, gazed upon his lands, and proclaimed to his followers: "The game is over. We scored more points."

Yes indeed, we surely did. Because we were better. Not only did we have better players, we had the elusive ingredient of *connectedness* that allowed the talent to cohere into a historically dominant team, where the whole was even better than the sum of its extraordinary parts. When I watched the defense, I often thought, they look like a school of fish, swarming the target in unison, every player in tune with the whole.

The draftniks who were concerned about Travon Walker's productivity because of his stats, they just don't understand why we were so dominant last year. Travon dropped in coverage, played inside mostly and disrupted plays while other guys got tackles, wreaked havoc in the backfield, played on special teams, and ran down backs and receivers from behind on big plays.

Stats? That's for draft analysts who think they matter more than doing what's best for the unit. "Two on me, somebody's free" is how winners talk, not "I led the league!" And they sure don't say "This is just a rebuilding year." Or "We'd-a won if....."

Saban blamed his players after his 33-18 loss to Georgia. I guess Saban needs to recruit better, because our backup wideouts played pretty doggoned well when the veteran stars couldn't play for most of the year. Alabama sure could have used our 3-star superstars, Ladd McConkey and AD Mitchell, in January. But they came here instead, after our recruiting evaluations ranked them higher than did the gurus in the recruiting-site film rooms, and on the staff in Tuscaloosa.

Our offense last year got no respect, and in retrospect, it still don't get no respect from some opinionators. According to <u>Michael Cunningham</u>, the 2021 Dawgs had "an elite defense and not-so-elite offense."

I don't know what Mr. Cunningham is looking at. It wasn't UGA games. The Dawgs ranked 4th nationally in first quarter scoring, and 10th nationally in second quarter scoring. With big second-half leads, they played backups, stopped throwing, and slowed the pace, leading to ranks of 27th in the third quarter and 50th in the 4th. They were still the #8 scoring offense in the country, mostly against SEC opponents; and were #4 in yards per play. What does an offense have to do to be considered elite around here?

It would be impossible for so many new and young players to play defense together the way last year's veterans did. The 2022 defense won't dominate teams the way those cats did, which doesn't mean they won't shut a lot of offenses down. Because we'll need more points this season, we won't pull the plug on the offense in the third quarter of every game. Although there are some concerns over who'll be available for any game, I think we could play five tight ends every snap on offense and do pretty well. Overall, I think the problem will be keeping many guys happy, not finding guys who can play.

What does the nation think of the 2022 Georgia Bulldogs? As much as they did in the preseason of the 2021 team. Last year the preseason All-SEC first and second teams featured a <u>single UGA defender</u>, Jordan Davis. Travon Walker? 3rd team all league.

For 2022, according to the Lamestream Sports Media, <u>Stetson Bennett is the 9th best QB in the SEC</u>. UGA will lose to <u>Oregon</u>, <u>Kentucky</u>, <u>South Carolina</u>, <u>Tennessee</u>, and <u>Alabama</u>. <u>ESPN's Heather Dinich</u>, in fact, picks Alabama to beat Georgia twice. To which I say, Heather, Where did you play?

And finally, Desmond Howard is picking Texas A&M to beat Alabama in the SEC Championship game, in spite of both teams being from the same division.

Nonetheless, Pavlovian Dawg fans are salivating about the season. Every team has hopes in fall camp. Some teams have expectations. Some teams have Geoff Collins.

But what about that undersized, low-ranked, overlooked, ever-doubted, game-managing, 9th best QB in the SEC? The guy who outplayed the Big 10 Champions in the Orange Bowl? The guy who outplayed Heisman Trophy winner Bryce Young in the national championship game? The guy who didn't make the short list for any trophies? The guy whose full name in the media is Former Walkon Stetson Bennett IV? The guy who didn't heave an underthrown, clean-pocket pick six at the championship game's most critical moment, right after Chris Fowler called the upcoming play "The biggest third down in Bryce Young's career"? The guy that even some Dawg fans still think should be holding the clipboard while the bigger prospects fight for the job?

That guy, the one with the heart of a lion and tenacity of a bulldog, is going to lead this team to glory.
