I felt pretty good going into this game. Missouri hadn't done much, and had had an emotional wringer of a game against Auburn the week before. We'd had a week to fix up the problems that had made the Kent State game uncomfortably close, and had something to prove. This one had all the makings of a Dawg beatdown of an overmatched opponent.

But when the game started, something was way off. The offensive timing wasn't there. Missouri owned the line of scrimmage for a half. Missouri made some big plays that kept getting them into good position for scores. Thank heaven for Jack Podlesny, who is emerging as one of our most dependable kickers in memory, and we've had a few that landed NFL jobs.

But it's hard to win games when you score points 3 at a time. And it's really hard to win when you fumble twice in the first half against a team that needs this win to save their season, and plays like it. And it's really, really hard to win a road SEC game when you enter the fourth quarter behind by 10 points.

Coach Smart saw a lot to admire in how his Bulldogs played as the game wore on: "We certainly didn't start very well, but I couldn't be prouder of our team. At halftime, nobody blinked, nobody questioned anything, it was the most together I've ever seen our team." At the start, though, it sure didn't look like a night that would eventually have the coach proud of his warriors. After the second fumble of the first half, it looked mighty grim. You can't take anything for granted in college football, where 20-year-olds are

required to act like grown men, and sometimes they act like teenagers. Just ask Pitt. And while you're up, see if Jimbo's boys can stop counting their money long enough to earn it on the field.

And while I'm thinking of it, Desmond Howard, how is your amazing preseason pick that Alabama would play A&M for the SEC championship game looking these days?

There was one oddity to the broadcast. The boys in the booth went on and on about how Missouri blew it with a procedure penalty after starting a drive one yard from the endzone following Cody Schrader's terrific 63-yard run—which was 61% of their ground game for the afternoon. The cost was 4 points, the difference in the game.

But they never mentioned what seemed obvious to me at the time, and what the postgame studio team identified as a great play, and about which Kirby Smart said afterwards, "The biggest play of the night is probably Malaki Starks' tackle on the 1-yard line or maybe 1-foot." And how appropriate that <u>Ben Watson, he of similar heroic fullfield sprint to prevent a touchdown by Champ Bailey</u>, was in the studio making the same point. Stark's hustle shows why you've got to be more than just talented. You've got to play with desire and discipline, too. And be well coached. Right, Jimbo?

Daijun Edwards is rightfully getting credited for his rugged play in the fourth quarter. Something overlooked: When everyone in the stadium knew we were going to run the ball on every play, the guy playing WR was Jackson Meeks, a forgotten man in the rotation. I can only assume that the kid can block like a champion. Another 3-star WR who has added a lot of value to the program.

And so, what to make of a game we were supposed to win in a blowout, but needed to come from 10 down with 14 minutes to play to get the W? A few weeks ago, people were wondering if this team might be better than the 2021 group. Probably not, I think. But thinking it is possible was fun, if a stretch. We've got some maturing to do before being that good.

With Jalen Carter taken out by a cheap shot, the DL rotation consisted of guys who were reserves or in high school last year. The defensive backfield has a lot of new guys in the rotation. You can't expect them to match a group of upperclassmen like last year's crew, especially given how well they played together after playing together for several years. After coming out blazing in the first three games, people (perhaps including players) began taking for granted that putting on that helmet bearing the G made everyone an All American. But young and inexperienced teams can be hard to convince of the need to take every opponent seriously. I suspect that now, they will.

They still need to work toward the cohesiveness, the connection, that made last year so special. It's not there yet. If I can see it isn't, so can the coaches. Expect it to improve after becoming a focal point from Monday-Friday.

The other area that has not quite lived up to expectations is the offensive line. They were magnificent in the fourth quarter when Missouri wore down after playing their hearts

out for three quarters. But they're not blowing people out. I'm sure they'll hear about it all week from the coaches.

When all is said and done, UGA is 5-0, 2-0 in the league. The expectations are very high, we exceeded them early, and have fallen short lately. What happens next is anybody's guess. It's time to stop expecting 49-0 games every weekend and get realistic. We're good, one of the nation's best. But we need to execute better and show it more on the field of play to make a playoff or win it.

#### THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD GOOD GUY ARCHIVE

After earning all-state honors in football and track at Daniel HS in Central, SC, and playing baseball and basketball on the side, Kent Lawrence played for Vince Dooley's Dawgs from 1965-1968, back when freshmen were ineligible. #24 was an early RBU star. He led the team to its 1966 SEC championship from the backfield, earning Cotton Bowl MVP honors while setting a program bowl rushing record of 149 yards that held up for most of the rest of the century. His great game won him induction into the Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame. He also returned punts and kickoffs for TDs and great field position in an era when fair catches and touchbacks were far less common. He was inducted into the Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame in 2003. But RB and return man were just two of his roles. He also caught a lot of passes from receiver positions. No reports on how much popcorn he sold in the stands. He busied himself in the offseason on the track, where he set the Georgia record of 9.5 seconds in the 100-yard dash and placed second in the SEC freshman track meet with a 9.4-second run. After UGA, Kent played with the Falcons and Eagles, flying high until his retirement. At UGA Kent earned bachelor's and master's degrees in education from UGA, then after he retired from the NFL, a law degree from the Woodrow Wilson College of Law at Oglethorpe University in Atlanta. His career took him through a position with the UGA police department, a role as investigator for the Western Circuit District Attorney's Office, and an appointment as the first police chief of the newly formed Clarke County Police Department in 1975. He ultimately was named a judge in Athens-Clarke County, where he presided over State Court from 1985 until his retirement in 2011, Kent was the founder of the county's DUI/Drug Court. Kent passed away in 2020 at age 72, The Georgia Athletic Department established the Judge Kent Lawrence Football Scholarship Endowment to honor him and provide a scholarship for a student-athlete pursuing a degree in criminal justice. He brought plenty of honor to UGA in his adult life, and it's great to see his name live on with an endowed scholarship to help others seek justice in the courts.
