The pattern this season has been for UGA to win the coin toss, choose to kick off, and then allow the opponent to put together a scoring drive to put the Dawgs in a 7-0 hole. On Saturday, they decided to simply spot Tennessee a score, and then go about the business of demolishing them in every aspect of the game.

Carson Beck has spent the season successfully blowing away "Yeah, but...." doubters. He was great in the spring game, but they said, "Yeah, but can he win when the games count?" With early teams on the schedule that provided little opposition, they asked, "Yeah, but can he play from behind?" Yes, again and again and again. After he won a few, they said, "Yeah, but can he beat SEC competition?" Yep, he could do that too. But then they asked, "Yeah, but he's been playing low-tier teams. Can he beat ranked opponents?" Just ask those opponents. Most recently, it's been, "Yeah, but can he go into Neyland Stadium and call a flawless game in one of the nation's biggest and loudest venues?" Check that box too, and add that afterwards Carson Beck concluded that "Auburn was louder," although probably not on Saturday. And now comes the ultimate: "Yeah, but can he beat Alabama?" We'll know soon. Richard Johnson of Sports Illustrated now deems Carson Beck to be "a certified good quarterback." Yeah, but is that good enough for a championship? I guess we'll know that before long as well.

The pregame analysis in the booth included Gary Danielson's assessment that in order for Tennessee to win, Joe Milton would need to play at the top of his game, the OL and RBs needed to dominate the line of scrimmage, the kicking game needed to capitalize on every opportunity, and the defense needed to control the line and smother Beck's targets. That strategy worked for one play. After that, it was all Dawgs. Later Josh Heupel allowed that "Today was not our best football." To which I say, Nada de caca, Sherlocka.

Who would have thought that McConkey, Lovett, and Thomas would combine for 2 catches for 27 yards, and it wouldn't even matter? That Edwards and Milton would combine for 100 yards, and that reserves would finish out the game in a near-empty stadium? That after the first spectacular TD run by Tennessee, the Vols would total 55 yards on the ground, with Jaylen Wright carrying 8 times for 15 yards as the bell cow of the UT backfield? That sixth-year QB and pro prospect Joe Milton would end up with a QBR of 32.5 to Beck's 93.1? That, at 7-4, UT is living Steve Spurrier's dream of playing in the Citrus Bowl? That Bear Alexander would record 6 tackles and still play for a big loser? Oh, sorry. Wrong game.

And now, in the middle of the Weekend Forecast, we pause for an on-air interview with Dolly Parton so she can pitch her new album. She was Tennessee's biggest threat all day, and to the programming's producers, evidently more important than that silly football game.

One of the stats that broadcasters have been posting lately is Kirby Smart's overall record as UGA coach, now standing at 92-15 (.86 winning %), with 8-2 in bowl games that include playoff teams. What they consistently overlook is that he was 8-5 in his first year. Since then, he's been 84-10 (.89 winning %) and is heading toward a national record winning streak, with Georgia Tech the next obstacle.

We've been hearing about Josh Heupel's high-powered offense ever since he took the bus up from UCF and brought rapid-fire playcalling to Knoxville. It got them 3 points after their opening TD run, which was not a consequence of a fast-paced offense. Meanwhile, Kirby Smart keeps showing that all that glitters is not the glitterati. The Dawgs just play tough, smart, disciplined, connected football without many gimmicks, just well-repped execution and great game preparation. After the Tech game, things get serious: Alabama, and then what we hope is a shot at the title. It's what we had high hopes for back in August, while everybody else was picking someone else to knock us off; and look where we are now. I can't wait to see where we stand in two weeks.

But first, as Coach Smart says, we've got Georgia Tech, now bowl-bound and believing in themselves. They'll take this game seriously and will intend to win it. I'm counting on the Dawgs to put them in their place and head back to ATL 12-0 and ready for the postseason.

THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD GOOD GUY ARCHIVE

Jamon Dumas-Johnson was one of those Covid-era athletes whose senior season at Saint Frances Academy in Baltimore was eliminated during the shutdown. He was nonetheless among those featured on the HBO documentary The Cost of Winning. 247 rated him as the nation's #198 recruit overall and #22 linebacker with Day 3 draft potential. No doubt those ratings have since been revised. As a freshman, #10 was the first LB on the field following the three upper classmen who went early in the NFL draft after the season, and fans were wondering, Who is this guy? He was everywhere, known as "Pop" based on a childhood nickname bestowed by his mother, but a name easily adapted to the way he plays football. His freshman season, Nolan Smith said, "Every time he's out there, you actually see a pop. Literally he goes in there for two plays, he gets the ball out. He went in for three plays against UAB. He caught a pick-six, ran it back. He gets forced fumbles and sacks within seconds. I love him." Another elder statesman, Chris Smith, noted that even as a freshman on a historically great defense, "He probably gets the most shots on ball than probably anybody, I want to say. Like I say, he wants that ball no matter what. He's keeping that in my mind. To see a guy that young, have that kind of mindset about the ball, the ball, it's definitely exciting to see." By his sophomore year Jamon was established as the main man in the linebacker corps, ultimately being named a Butkus Award finalist ahead of the 21 guys ranked ahead of him in his graduating class. He got this notice without the raging statistics that often drive player evaluations, instead gaining distinction for quarterbacking a ferocious defense and being the primary communicator. That ability to coordinate 11 men into a unit led him to say, "It's a lot of communication [that] goes on, because teams know that if you line straight-up it ain't gonna be good for them. So they try to get us to communicate, motion out, motion in. Just try to see if we can communicate." The orchestrator of a sophisticated defense needs to be intelligent and prepared as well as athletic. What Jamon packs between his ears has plenty of Pop. He is pursuing a Public Health major with support from a William J. MacKenna Football Scholarship. No doubt his work in public health will have to wait while he completes his football career. He's got all the tools to make it work, no matter where he goes.
