

Another slow start, this one lasting a half. I was seated behind Coach Knute "Bear" Lombardi, who was raining down hate on Mike Bobo, beginning with the first series and no doubt lasting late into the night. Brother Willy was in Athens for the game, and we were impressed at the Coach's vast knowledge of what should have been done on the previous play throughout the game. And when the play didn't succeed, he knew who was to blame, when he wasn't blaming Carson Beck.

I didn't watch the game with The Scowlmeister, but I imagine that it wasn't pretty. The first half gave us little to cheer about, and some of the faithful rewarded the team's effort with boos and jeers. Not from my seat. I was deeply concerned at our 3-point total and the 11-point deficit to a team we were supposed to blow out of the stadium. But boo my own guys? No way.

Not to create any of those nasty false equivalences, but a lot of teams once again started slowly. Alabama against a lousy SFU team; Tennessee against a surprisingly impressive Florida team; and plenty more around the nation. The scoreboard showed a lot of teams

that couldn't get early traction, often against overmatched opponents. To game-wrecker Mykel Williams, the Dawgs sleepwalked through the first half before a caffeinated second half revealed the team we hope they can be. And that team looked mighty good.

South Carolina came to play. They were terrific in the first half. I don't think I ever saw Ohio State's WRs get as open on our defense as the wideouts did for the Gamecocks in the first half. It was a bit of a stunner to a home crowd that's grown accustomed to, and likely complacent about, our defense's dominance. On the post-game radio broadcast, the guys talked about adjustments we made in coverage and in the pass rush to produce a very rough second half for Rattler after he looked so good in the first. The defensive pressure chased him all over the field, forced picks on their last drives, and shut down their passing game the way we obliterated their rushing game.

I've got to give Coach Beamer a lot of credit for preparing his team for this game. Another tough critic, Kirby Smart, was also impressed: "Hats off to Shane Beamer and his team. What a tremendous job those guys did. They came into a tough environment with some relatively young players. They showed great composure and started with a really great plan against us. I thought they out-executed us for sure in the first quarter. I told him, 'Your kids played hard.' They played really hard."

When all was said and done, I was glad for a tough, competitive game that required our guys to dig deep and come back from a double-digit deficit. Teams don't improve blowing out cruddy opponents, either physically or mentally. Games like this are important in developing team character and toughness. We might have expected 60 minutes of fire and brimstone, but the most important 30 minutes were all Dawg and sobered the players up to the fact that opponents practice and want to win too, especially against the nation's most dominant team. Even Coach Knute "Bear" Lombardi didn't have much to complain about in the second half, at least not out loud.

Another point made on the post-game broadcast was that one thing Mike Bobo has historically done is ride a hot running back. We rotated a lot early, but when Daijon Edwards started to hammer hard on their defense, he stayed in there and wanted the ball, and he ran like a champion. It's good to have him back. That cat is a gamer.

So, a slow start to the games and, in a sense, to the season. The record and ranking still look good, but we are not yet a great football team. We complete the exhibition season next week, then the real games begin. I'm happy that we had this one to sober up the players to the fact that they are beatable; that the last two seasons are in the past and it's up to them to write their own histories. No amount of coaching from the stands will change the real dynamics of the season. That's up to the guys on the field.

What would you think of a cornerback with measurables of 5'-8", 165 pounds? How about a stick of dynamite that size? That would be **Glenn Ford** coming out of Columbus-Carver HS in 1994, where he earned All American honors playing above his weight. Jim Donnan brought him to Athens on a scholarship, where he lettered for four years and started for three, often lining up alongside safety Kirby Smart. At UGA Ford completed two undergraduate degrees, in Consumer Economics and Housing Development. After graduating he had a shot at playing in the NFL, but injuries led to his retirement and redirection. That direction was coaching and teaching the game, including stints with the Washington Redskins [now Commanders] and Cleveland Browns, aided by his participation in the Bill Walsh Diversity Program. Returning to the Atlanta area, Glenn founded and became CEO of DareU Academy in Atlanta, which specializes in developing young football talent at all positions. DareU seeks to "train and expand the minds of every young person who has the dreams of going to college, and we will develop a game plan to get them towards their aspirations," Ford says. "We have set our sights high and are changing lives. We are so inspired by the courage, hard work,

and the determination of our kids that it drives us to take our organization to new heights in support of them." His students have included a number of young men who have taken their talents to Athens, all shaped and advanced through Glenn's tutelage. He's become a highly respected authority among college coaches who rely on his recommendations, and has been considered for assistant coach openings at UGA based on the quality of his work with high school players. Glenn was an asset to UGA, and he is now an important figure in the lives of a lot of young men, whether they play college football or not. Keep it up, big fella. Your inspiration has provided the role model for a lot of young people whose lives have been enriched by your example.
