After his dramatic, game-saving tackle against Tennessee, Brett Thorson was given the day off by Coach Smart. The team hopes he'll get Friday off as well.

It was another noon game, and another very slow start by the defense against a team in turmoil over its coaching change, itself a consequence of a lot of losing. It was a bit shocking that an awful UMass could move the ball so easily. Fortunately, the offense was clicking. Their whopping yardage and point totals should make us smile, but should not make us feel as if we have accomplished something great. The opponent just wasn't very good.

Which makes the lackadaisical defensive effort so difficult to understand. To Coach Smart, there might be a benefit to the defense's underwhelming afternoon: "Probably the best thing we need for a wake-up call." The greatest cost to the defense's showing was that reserves only got in for a few series, instead of playing the majority of second-half snaps as anticipated.

Coach Smart's appreciation of a wake-up call was a consequence of an uninspired effort by the defense: "We did not tackle well, but it was more than just tackling. It was—like, I hate to say it, I just don't think that our guys were ready to play and energized to play as their guys were. Their guys wanted it more than us, and it's very rare that I could sit up here and say that. Like, they were playing harder, they were moving us, they were playing physical. They had some nice RPOs and some nice play designs, but it wasn't about that. It's, I want to—like, desire. That's the biggest thing."

At least the Tech game will be at night. No wake-up calls required.

Meanwhile, the rest of the SEC continued to play rock-paper-scissors, and three-and-out continued to mean more than a bad series. Mississippi and Colorado, see you in the Pop-Tarts Bowl. And bring your popcorn. Alabama and ATM U, I guess it's the Gator Bowl and Citrus Bowl—no championship playoff for you. And don't weep too much about Indiana making the field when you're not.

It's been that kind of year. Auburn fans stormed the field after their upset of ATM U, a sign that their program is now in the business of rejoicing over wins they used to expect. One more win and they clinch an invitation to the Famous Toastery Bowl. Ditto Oklahoma's field-storm after inexplicitly stomping Alabama to become bowl-eligible, something they usually wrap up in October. Next week's Iron Bowl is now a game of great interest after Auburn's win and Alabama's near-skunking in Norman, called by local wags the worst loss in program history: "Let me be the first to apologize to Vanderbilt. You did not hand Alabama the worst loss in its history. Oklahoma just did. That was an absolutely embarrassing and inexplicable ass-kicking of a team that controlled its playoff destiny by a team with one SEC win."

In the remote world beyond the SEC standings, according to Coach Deion Sanders of Colorado, their 8-3 record had produced a rather stinky form of rat poison, leading to their loss to 5-6 Kansas: "We were smelling ourselves. That's on me. They can't stop reading the stuff about who we are. That's tough. So you try to humble everything around you including yourself." Humility is Coach Sanders' trademark quality, as is avoiding publicity and keeping a low profile in order to focus on game preparation. The loss, according to Coach Sanders, followed from the players letting down their immaculate coaches: the Buffaloes "gotta do what [defensive coordinator Rob Livingston] called." Meanwhile, Travis Hunter's post-TD Heisman poses are going to be this year's Cheshire Cat: All that's left when he leaves will be the pose.

Next up: A game shaping up to be of national importance when Georgia Tech comes to town. Nobody's guaranteed a win, although home teams do seem to have the advantage. The coaches have some work to do to convince the defense that showing up isn't sufficient. Tech is a dangerous opponent and believes it will win. 93,000 Dawg fans beg to differ. It'll come down to the hand-to-hand combat between the hedges. Will the chapel bell ring at the end? Can't wait to find out.

Disconcerting Signals

U.S. Rep. Virginia Foxx, the North Carolina Republican who chairs the House Education and Workforce Committee, said Friday that Georgia Tech should have ended the arrangement between Georgia Tech and Tianjin University in China because of the threats the agreement posed to U.S. national security, including trade secret theft and research collaboration to advance China's military. Carson Beck originally committed to Alabama coming out of Mandarin High School in Jacksonville, where he won a state championship and was named the 2018 Florida Mr. Football while being a camper at the Elite 11 Finals his senior year. He originally attended Providence HS but transferred after 2 years, not to a powerhouse but to a team coming off a 2-8 season, a team with nowhere to go but up. He also excelled as a pitcher on Mandarin's baseball team, with a Florida Gator offer to take the mound in Gainesville. Fortunately, he came to his senses and changed his commitment to UGA after Jim Chaney, who didn't like Carson's throwing motion, left for Tennessee and the new Dawg staff saw a great prospect and went after him. Georgia, he said, "was always the school I wanted to go to ever since eighth grade, seventh grade. I absolutely fell in love with the place." His dad Chris had once been stationed in Athens, and the family felt the vibe and wanted to hum along. A guy with such talent and recognition might easily end up with a big head and exit a crowded QB room shortly after entering it. But Carson knew where he belonged and toughed it out, a competitor all the way. As Coach Smart put it when Carson finally was named the starter in his fourth year on campus, "He's done the best job. We communicated that to the other quarterbacks, and we've kind of been operating that way. The other guys have done a tremendous job in terms of competing, and they're going to continue to do that." Iron sharpens iron, as Coach likes

to say. Even back in high school, Carson knew that competition makes for a better player: "I always played with a chip on my shoulder. Sitting behind someone I felt I could have started over freshman and sophomore year [in high school] made me that much better." And then he did it again in college. In an era of swelled egos and social media hype, Carson is a refreshing change, always putting the team first and presenting himself as humble and appreciative of his opportunities. He's supported his Sport Management major with a Carl E. Sanders Football Scholarship and a Loy D. Thompson IV Football Scholarship, showing excellence in the classroom. And he's turned out pretty well in football too. His future is wide open, and he won't need a tight-window throw to navigate it successfully. He's a winner and one we're glad to have in Athens.



THE FORECAST DAWGS VS. GEORGIA TECH

Earlier this year, we played at Mississippi in what was called the biggest game in the history of the program. This week may not be the biggest in GT history, but it's the biggest, I think, of the last decade or two. Their win over Miami was huge, but mostly as a league game against a team that was unbeaten yet with a very dodgy performance in too many games. GT is mighty fired up for this one after going unbeaten at Bobby Dodd Stadium at Hyundai Field in front of crowds averaging about 38,000 in a stadium holding 52,000 (for you math majors, that's 73% of capacity).
