
THE DAWGMEISTER'S WEEKEND FORECAST: DAWGS OFFER NO CLEMENCY TO CLEMSON

THE FORECAST DAWGS VS. CLEMSON

And it's time to tee it up amidst the fiberglass at the Benz! The Dawgs are undertaking the Schedule from Hell, and it will be quite a season as they battle ranked team after ranked team. Can we do it? Hell yes. I'm all in on these guys.

When I first saw this season's schedule, I thought, no way we can go unbeaten. But then, who's better than UGA? The only comparable roster is at Ohio State, and they will maul their way into the playoff this season, facing the likes of Northwestern and Purdue week in and week out. We will have a pretty slim margin of error against our SEC schedule, especially in the key games away from home.

The main concern among my consultants and me—that is, The Scowlmeister and Little Woolly—has been whether or not we'll get dominance from the defensive line, or just excellence. But Lordy, the linebackers are tremendous, and in spite of the turnover and youth infusion, the DBs look pretty solid to me. And then there's the offense, where every position is loaded. UGA runs 6 deep in scholarship backs, plus Cash Jones and his 7.6 yards-per-carry and 8.4 yards-per-catch last year. I think we'll play 4-5 in most games when the room is healthy, keeping them fresh and ferocious, with guys like jet-propelled freshman Dwight Phillips playing on specialty downs. We might be a couple of RBs short in the opener, but have plenty to cover their absence.

Gary Danielson last season made one of his astute observations—yes, he's astute, and his passion for Nick Saban doesn't undo his ability to break a game down. He said that because UGA had so many different guys capable of making plays, a defense had no idea of what Beck would do on any play. Our coaches weren't promoting one guy for All America status by featuring him over others, and won't again this year, I think. I don't believe, for instance, that Trevor Etienne will lead the nation in rushing, <u>as one observer has predicted</u>, because he won't get 20 carries a game. Anybody who takes the field is a threat, and nobody needs to be The One And Only Man.

I think that the offensive record book will get a makeover this year, but on the team level, not individual, with the possible exception of the QB position, where we don't rotate. So even if the defense doesn't have Jalen and Jordan plugging things up at the line of scrimmage, there are plenty of ways to win football games, and we have them in the offensive schemes, playbook, and personnel. And yeah, that defense will be mighty good too. And who's got a better kicker and punter than them Dawgs?

Clemson is a solid opponent who needs this game desperately. But they'll go home wondering what hit them. UGA 63, Clemson 3
