THE DAWGMEISTER'S WEEKEND FORECAST: DAWGS SPIN GOLDEN EAGLES INTO STRAW

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They're baaaaaaaaaack.

That's the UGA defense I'm talking about. The big question going into the opener was whether the defense could restore its dominance after last year's mild dropoff. The answer: Hell yes.

The Dawgs' defense does tend to start out with a bang. In the 6 season openers prior to Saturday's endzone-free blowout, UGA had given up 2 TDs, total: to Arkansas in 2020 and to Tennessee Martin in 2023. Clemson was supposed to be a major test. Cade Klubnik had a 5-star recruiting rating after high school ball in Texas, cradle of quarterbacks, and a year as a starter under offensive genius Garrett Riley. Clemson was ready to show they were back in the playoff hunt. And they got stoned all night at the line of scrimmage, not to mention the second and third layers of the defense. It was a glorious performance, one that suggests that the players were a little honked off about all the questions about their lost dominance.

According to Dawg fan favorite Mike Griffith, "**Stock down: The Georgia defensive line** was gouged too often, and lower body injuries to starting defensive tackles Warren Brinson, Nazir Stackhouse and Mykel Williams (ankle) are cause for concern."

I somehow missed this disappointing performance. Here's what I saw from that stock-down defensive line:

Clemson amassed 2.1 yards per carry. Maybe it was that one run in which they got 20% of their rushing yards that caught Mike's attention; they sure did gouge us on that play. And then there was that 6-yard run, and if you add those top two runs, you get one-third of their DL-gouging rushing attack. And that's with most DL starters out of the game for a spell with injuries, and other guys sitting out altogether with their own maladies. Yessir, Mike, we are concerned about the DL room. So is Tennessee Tech, I'm sure.

And we played offense, too, mostly in the second half. The game raised some interesting questions. Branson Robinson, a guy I have been very enthusiastic about, ran 7 times for 12 yards. It seemed to me he never got any blocking, and ran mostly between the tackles. Was Clemson simply too stout to pound the ball on? Is Robinson still recovering from last year's devastating injury, and not yet explosive? Only the guys in the film room and locker room know for sure. Frazier was the more effective runner on Saturday. Did they block better for him? Was the second half playcalling better suited to his style? Does Frazier read and react to holes better than Robinson? Is Frazier just that good? I can't say. But it was good to see the offense break out the running game in the second half. It sure made Carson Beck's day a lot better.

Dabo explains the biggest thing:

- "Biggest thing is when you don't finish, . . . you got to play four quarters."


